
# what child is this? exploring the wonder of ADVENT with KIDStory





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#### ADVENT | what child is this?

#### What is Advent?

Advent simply means "COMING" in Latin. The season of Advent is the four Sundays leading up to Christmas Day. It prepares our hearts for celebrating the coming of Jesus...the birth of the Christ. In our series "What Child Is This?" we will explore not only why Jesus' coming mattered to the entire world, but open up conversations about why His coming matters to us as individuals...and even what it means that He will be coming again!

Over the years there are various traditions that families and churches have followed to make the season of Advent meaningful, including creating a wreath, opening a daily calendar, or the weekly lighting of candles. If your family wants to add in some physical tradition to our exploration of Advent, you can go online and find all sorts of different traditions that may be a great fit for your family.

For this devotional, you will see that lighting a candle is incorporated each week. The lighting of candles usually signifies that something important is about to happen. There is a reason to light each new candle, but candles from the previous weeks are lit as well, so as to build anticipation of what is about to happen. If you choose to use something different for your family, or skip this element, simply adjust as is appropriate! No matter how you go about it, memories will be made and Christmas will become more meaningful.

One thing is for sure, regardless of the tradition, the reading of different portions of the biblical account has always been an element of Advent and that's where we want to help your entire family explore this celebration of Jesus' coming!

LAST THING...This devotional is meant to be used to the max. Draw, write, cut things out, rip out pages – do whatever it takes to make this time very personal for you, those you live with, extended family, and friends. Our goal is to get everyone to interact with one another and ultimately to hear what God has to say to each of you. Every household looks different, so don't let that stop you...you can discover all kinds of things about Christmas you may not have known. As God approached His people concerning the coming of His Son, it was said, "Do not be afraid..." Enter this Christmas season filled with faith in a God who is passionate about having a relationship with each and every person.

#### What is KIDStory@Home | what child is this?

We recognize your desire to be the spiritual leader in your home, but you may not know where to start. It seems best to rely on the local church leaders to take on this role but quite honestly, you have the greatest influence in your child's life – greater than any church or ministry. We believe what you will find here in KIDStory@Home will revolutionize the way you engage with your children: physically, emotionally and spiritually. We believe God will transform lives as you create a relational learning environment where you and your children can become eye-witnesses and active participants in God's Story and not just distant observers. KIDStory relies on the working of the Holy Spirit as you use Jesus' method of teaching: telling stories, having interactive experiences and meaningful discussions.

These strategies are fun to learn, easy to use and share with others. You will see how it is better to listen rather than lecture ... listen to the Holy Spirit and the responses of your children. Then you can encourage them to also listen and be obedient to God's voice. KIDStory is about God transforming a life, a family and ultimately a community through His Story and His Spirit.

- Allow the content of the story to shape your prayers throughout the week as you reflect back on it

My Story allows everyone to share a personal story that helps connect them to the major theme in God's Story.

Using the video, you'll be able to watch the story told together as a family. If you choose to revisit the story throughout the week, you may choose other means of retelling it through activities, reading or acting.

This manual contains a number of addition questions you can ask over dinner or while driving in the car. Remember that the goal isn't to get any right answer; rather it's to respond to what the Holy Spirit is revealing to each of us in his unique way.

Move the students from remembering facts in the story to what God is doing in their hearts and lives. We want the Spirit to speak to each person for the implication that will be for them specifically.


Join Steve as he explores the promises and prophecies found throughout the Old Testament, and specifically in Isaiah 9:6, to discover that HOPE had always been the first step in anticipating the coming of Jesus. But why did He need to come and what would He do when He got here? The many, many promises and prophecies helped paint that picture and sustain the HOPE of God's people for a very long time.

- God's Story Exploring what the Bible tells us about a HOPE for what's to come.
  - Participating together in an activity or game that helps everyone retell the story, so it sticks and empowers us to share it with others. You can use the Newspaper Template on the next page and let everyone create their own cover story about what they just heard! For extra activities, visit page 13.
- Let's Connect Sharing what we heard in the story through our head, hearts and hands. For extra questions to help you keep the conversation going, visit page 16.
- Huddle Up Closing in prayer together as a family, offering thanks and blessings.

**CANDLE LIGHTING:** Light the first candle for this week. Remember that God gave this dark world **HOPE** as a beacon of light, as they waiting for Jesus to come.

FUN FACT | Did you know that Jesus fulfilled more than 60 major prophecies from the Old Testament and that the New Testament points to more than 270 ripple effects of minor prophecies? The odds of one man doing this are beyond compare! If Jesus had fulfilled just 8 of these prophecies the odds of Him pulling it off would have been something like 1:100,000,000,000,000,000! That means you are 6.9 TRILLION times more likely to be struck by lightning than for one person to fulfill just 8 of the prophecies...and the Gospels record more than 60 being fulfilled!







**CANDLE LIGHTING:** Relight the first candle (HOPE) and then light the second for this week. Remember that trusting God's promises is what **FAITH** is all about. It may not look the way we expected, but God is always **FAITHFUL** to His children and He always keeps His promises.

FUN FACT | Did you know that priests like Zechariah used to wear bells and a rope around one ankle, so the people outside could hear them moving? It was forbidden for anyone else to go into the temple, so if the bells stopped for too long, they pulled the rope and got the priest out, in case something happened!






Join Steve as he explores the story of a young woman named Mary that is visited by an angel with news that will bring JOY to the entire world. In fact, this young woman is a relative of Zechariah and Elizabeth. When she runs off to tell Elizabeth about the news, someone unexpected responds with great JOY too at the coming of Jesus!

**CANDLE LIGHTING:** Relight the first two candles (HOPE & FAITH) and then light the third for this week. Remember Jesus is the light of the world and His coming allows us to experience the true JOY of a renewed relationship with God and with everyone around us!

FUN FACT | Did you know that Elizabeth's baby would become John the Baptist and would meet Jesus again when they were both adults? When they met, John recognized Jesus and told everyone, "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world!" Then he baptized Jesus in the Jordan river.




Join Steve as he explores the story of shepherds in the fields, tending their sheep, when the moment arrives and the One that is *coming* has finally *come*! The messenger that visits them seems terrifying, but he has come in **PEACE**...in fact, he has come to announce **PEACE**! It is Jesus' birth that has created a new era and opportunity for **PEACE** on earth.

**CANDLE LIGHTING:** Relight the first three candles (HOPE, FAITH & JOY) and then light the final candle for this week. Remember that our **PEACE** with God was gifted to us through Jesus and our **PEACE** in God is because of the gift of His Holy Spirit when Jesus comes into our hearts!

FUN FACT | Did you know that in 330 AD a huge church was built on top of the place in Bethlehem where some people believe the newborn baby Jesus slept in His manger? It is called The Church of the Nativity and you can still visit it.



#### Additional Activities | what child is this?

It is important to retell the Bible story after it's been told. Students engage in the story through retelling activities and it helps them in learning it well enough that they can retell it to someone else. Teaching others creates the greatest degree of retention.

The retell activities should be fun and engage the student in the story. Listed below are various ways to retell a Bible story using varied engagement strategies. One way not listed, if the children have Bibles, is to have them open them and re-read the story, perhaps even using different translations. This can also be done by someone reading the story and the leader asking sequential questions which everyone then answers by looking in the Bible.

#### ART

- Drawing: Students can draw what they saw or what they liked best as the story was being told.
   Have each student share their pictures with the rest of the group.
- Group Poster: Students work together on making a poster that can tell the Bible Story. Allow
  the students to retell the story by using what they drew on the poster.
- **Story Parts:** Students select a certain scene of the story to draw. Have the students put the story in order by the drawings that have been made and retell it as a group.
- **Comic Strip:** Students fold a piece of paper into 4-8 sections. For each scene or action in the Bible story, students draw a picture or object in each box in the order that it happens in the story.
- **Billboard:** Design a roadside billboard of the Bible story or how you see yourself connecting with it.
- Pictionary: Different parts of the story are randomly given out and each student needs to draw
  what they have been given until someone guesses what it is.
- Tee Shirt Design: Have each student design the front of a tee shirt that could tell the major parts of the story.
- Logo Design: If there could be just one picture, with no words, that would best tell the Bible story, what would that be? Have the students draw it. You can use this simple picture as a way of reviewing the different Bible stories in weeks to come.
- **Book Cover Design:** Students design and draw their own book cover with words and pictures that best capture the different parts of the Bible story.

#### Additional Activities | what child is this?

#### **DRAMA / PERFORMANCE**

- Act it Out: Assign different characters of the story to each of the students. Let them practice
  before actually acting out the story. See if there are one or two students who want to be the
  person telling the story while the other children act it out.
- Retell: through a character's eyes.
- **Create a Song:** Create a song that will retell the Bible Story. You might use a song that the students are very familiar with and then change the words so it retells the Bible story.
- Partners: Have the students get into smaller groups of 2-3. Each student will take a turn
  retelling the story. If someone gets stuck and can't remember the next part, the others in the
  group can help them.
- Pantomime: Divide the group into several smaller groups. Have one act out the first part of the story without using words. The other groups have to say what is happening. Rotate groups and continue until the story is complete
- **Objects:** Give each group 1-3 different objects. The group needs to use the different objects in the retelling of the story. They can add other objects, but must use the 3 objects given to them.
- **Human Slide Show:** Find a big cloth to use as a curtain. Two students will hold it up and then drop it when you tell them. Pick several students to be the characters in the story. For each story segment, while the curtain is up, have the students get into a position as though there were a picture or painting of that part of the story. They are to remain perfectly still and then have the cloth dropped so the rest of the group can see it. Each scene changes as the story is retold.
- Dance: Retell the story through a dance with or without music and words.
- **Top Ten:** Have the kids, either as a group or individually, write out the top 10 events of the story.
- **Journals:** The children are given the opportunity to just quietly sit and journal what was in the story and what it meant to them.

#### Additional Activities | what child is this?

#### **GAMES**

- Musical Chairs: Make a circle of chairs (facing out) for each person in your group (minus one). When the music starts, the students start walking in a clockwise direction around the chairs. When you stop the music, everyone quickly finds a chair. The final person standing shares a portion of the story. No students are eliminated. No chairs are removed. Continue doing this until the entire story is retold.
  - **Ball Game:** Identical to Musical Chairs, but played by passing a ball or balloon. Can be played with music or simply the words, "GO" and "STOP". (using a balloon...try adding a marble or small round pebble in the balloon before you inflate it to increase the fun)
  - Rope Game: Identical to Musical Chairs, but the string moves, not the students. Using a long piece of string/rope, tie the ends together to form a loop. Students stand in a circle with everyone holding the rope. They will move the rope in one direction until you say "STOP". The student closest to the knot, shares the next part of the story.
  - Movers & Shakers: Spice up the games by adding a feature to HOW they tell their portion of the story!!! Some examples could be:
    - In a low voice
    - In a high voice while jogging in place
    - In a whisper while tiptoeing
    - In a robot voice while doing the robot
- Line Up: Have the students line up in height order. Starting with the tallest, share the story sections until complete.
- Hide and Seek: Write phrases of the Bible Story on cards or strips of paper. Place them
  around the room. Send the students to find them all and then place themselves in the proper
  order. Have someone read and retell the story.
- Story Chase: Write each part of the story on small cards. Randomly tape one card on the
  back of each student. Have them assemble the story on their own without removing the card.
  They should line up so that each student can see the phrase in front of them. Have the
  student retell the story by reading the card on the person in front of them.

#### Hands (Actions)

My goal is to seek the guidance of the Holy Spirit to respond and apply what I've learned from the story.

- 8. Do you want to know God like this? Is there something happening right now in your life where God/Jesus/the Holy Spirit could help you?
- 9. Who can you share this story with this week?
- 10. How do you think God wants you to have a part in His story?

#### Prayers and Blessings | what child is this?

A critical moment with your family is what we call: *Huddle Up*. This is when you can gather everyone with more intentionality, with greater intimacy, to come into the Lord's presence. Some light a candle, others dim the lights and just have a night light on. If you are doing this at bedtime, maybe have the children lie down and get them settled in to go to sleep.

This is a time to **pray with and for one another**, to give thanks for everyone's *Highs* of the day and to ask for God's intervention in your *Lows*. What were some other things that came up in your discussion of the Bible Story that can be brought before the Lord where family members can be praying for one another? This is an opportunity for everyone to join together and be in God's presence. Our walk with Jesus isn't just about going to church or even coming together every day for KIDStory@Home, but how He is always there, every moment of every day no matter where we are or who we are with.


End your time together by **giving a blessing** to everyone. Something supernatural happens when people are blessed. We are asking for an impartation from God to be on our children. We see this tradition throughout the Bible: Abraham with Isaac, Isaac with Jacob, Moses with Joshua, Jesus with the children and many others. It is also a time to create hope and a vision for our children. It is a time to give a physical touch that is appropriate and meaningful. It could be the holding of hands or placing your hand on your child's shoulder or head. Some families end with a special song or Bible verse. These build traditions in our family gatherings.

Let's be like Jesus and create an environment where children felt welcomed, where Jesus touched and blessed them. We can do the same for the children He has given us.

Children are not just learning from a book, but through relationships.

#### **REACHING A UNIVERSAL AUDIENCE**

The methods used to tell and retell God's story are Bible centered, fun and engaging. The questions posed by leaders are not just for retention, but for transformation of the heart and mind, leading to real life application. This gives leaders the chance to disciple each child by following up on the things that the Holy Spirit is teaching and revealing.

Whether you are in kids or youth ministry, the leader of a small group, preparing for an overseas mission trip, running a local VBS, or simply a mom, dad or grandparent; you will find this approach to learning equally refreshing and valuable as you are equipped with proven tools for effectively sharing God's Word.

#### **CENTERED ON CORE ESSENTIALS**

Children are transformed by learning who God is, who they are, and how to have a real and personal relationship with Jesus. We believe this happens through the 5 core essentials of KIDStory:
